I had not been sad in his presence before: so the king asked me, "Why does your face look so sad when you are not ill? This can be nothing but sadness of heart." 3A. Overcome ___ Nehemiah 2:2b-3 (NIV) I was very much afraid, but I said to the king, "May the king live forever! Why should my face not look sad when the city where my fathers are buried lies in ruins, and its gates have been destroyed by fire?" 3B. Pray Nehemiah 2:4-5 (NIV) The king said to me, "What is it you want?" Then I prayed to the God of heaven, and I answered the king, "If it pleases the king and if your servant has found favor in his sight, let him send me to the city in Judah where my fathers are buried so that I can rebuild it."
